



# Can I setup Parental Controls on a BYOD device?

Parental controls can be used in conjunction with Intune, the Department's BYOD Device Management Solution. Enrolling your child's device into Intune, will mean your child will be able to:

- access the school Wi-Fi network and have school email automatically set up and configured
- access the school's learning applications and websites.
- self-manage their device - requires administration rights

## Can I Install Parental Control Software?

Some Parental Control software does not work with the school network. When a student searches for anything online while having parental supervision software/apps such as Qustodio and Net Nanny installed, it tries to route that request through a server that will filter for keywords etc. Due to this behaviour, our internet security at Kenmore SHS marks this as an attempt to use a VPN (something that attempts to bypass our filtering) and stops any and all traffic being sent.

IT doesn't recommend installing parental control software/apps that function in this way onto CYOD or BYOD systems for this reason. IT recommends parental control solutions that work by filtering and monitoring at the network level e.g. home wireless.

## Other recommended solutions

There are a few valid options for blocking websites/monitoring use at home. Here are some suggestions that have worked in the past that won't affect school network access:

- Your Wi-Fi router will likely have functionality where you can add to a list of sites you would like blocked. You would need to refer to the user manual for how to do this.
- There are solutions you get hardware to install on your home network that provides monitoring and filtering. This aligns with Family Zone's, Family Zone Box, (<https://www.familyzone.com/anz/families/how-it-works>)
- One other such example is Circle (<https://meetcircle.com/>)
- You can filter your network by website DNS. A website's address can be blocked by the service that turns the website address into an IP address. Our recommendation is OpenDNS, (<https://www.opendns.com/home-internet-security/>)
